REFUGEE TO SPEAK AT "Y" ON HORRORS OF GERMAN CONCENTRATION CAMP

Announcing!—the anticipated arrival of Gerhart Seger, formerly of the German Reichstag, who will speak at the "Y" cottage, Thursday, January 31, at 8 p. m., under the auspices of the Union Forum.

The Forum, it will be remembered, is a fusion group of the "Y's", representing the Protestants; Newman Club, the Catholics; and the Hillel Foundation, the Jewish students, for the purpose of furthering common interests. Seger will be the second speaker presented by the joint group.

The German refugee's life reads like a story book, and is far more interesting than the most vivid fiction because it is real. Having faced the horrors of the great war, as an ace in the German flying corps, Seger became an active pacifist leader. He was a leading Social Democrat in the German Reichstag, member of the Foreign Policy Committee, and Secretary General of the German Peace Society, all of which brought him in close contact with Nazi leaders, including Hitler himself.

Nazis Seize Seger As "Protective Arrest"

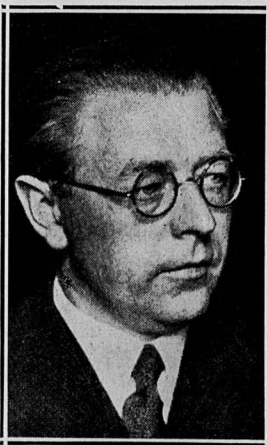
On the Nazi party's advent into power, Seger was one of the first persons arrested—and, like the old French *lettre de caché*, was given no reason for his seizure other than "protective arrest." After three months in prison, he was sent to the Nazi concentration camp at Oranienburg, from which he escaped after six months.

Thursday night, 8 p. m., at the "Y" cottage is the time and place of his talk, and little effort is anticipated to fill to capacity the lecture room. The public is invited.

The Hillel Players Will Dramatize Recent "Campus Riots"

The first consideration of the Hillel players will be a one-act play entitled "Red-Riot on the Campus" which will depict campus life as many students at the University recently saw it. The date is as yet undecided but it will be some time during the last of February. Following that, preparation will begin on the crowning dramatics undertaking of the year, a three-act play to be given the last of March or the first of April at International House.

VISITING PROFESSOR TO ADDRESS FORUM

Bonn Will Speak On "The Future of Liberalism"

Formerly of the Berlin Handelschule, and specialist in international financial and commercial relations. Professor Moritz Bonn will be attached to the Economics Department of the University for the Spring Semester. He just comes from a year's teaching at the University of London.

Professor Bonn is renewing friendships made at California during one of his former sojourns. He has made five trips to the United States and has studied the country in all of its sections and communities, large and small. Of California he says: "The Bay District has always seemed to me to be the most civilized spot in America. Here people have learned the art of living."

Bonn Sees Breaking of Empires

Professor Bonn is a close student of imperialism. In the movements that are sweeping across Europe he sees the first signs of the breaking of Empires. Speaking of the difference between Italian Fascism and German Nazism, Professor Bonn characterizes the Italian movement as an exaltation of culture and the German movement as a revolt against culture. Prof. Bonn is of the opinion that Hitlerism is due to maintain itself for many years and expresses himself as most pessimistic as to its effects on German life, learning and culture.

Professor Bonn will speak before the Hillel Open Forum Tuesday, February 12, at 8 p. m., on "The Future of Liberalism."

Hillel Chorus Sings On "New Time"

MAX WARBURG'S FAREWELL SPEECH

The Paris Tageblatt of Nov. 4th, carried the report of a banquet given in honor of Max Warburg, senior director of the Hamburg-American Line and head of the Hamburg banking firm of that name. Max Warburg, together with Albert Ballin, transformed the Hamburg-American Line from a few tramp steamers into the greatest mercantile fleet in the world.

Adolph Hitler considered the Jew, Warburg, as the head of this great fleet, a thorn in his flesh. Word was sent to Hamburg that he be removed. The painfulness of this task was so keenly felt by his co-directors that it was decided to give a banquet in his honor — the idea being to act as if now, in his old age, his task completed, Warburg would be thanked for his great services and would retire.

Officials Gather At Banquet

Assembled at the banquet were the heads of Germany's great shipping industry and government marine officials. They were assembled to witness the downfall of the great old man of the House of Warburg.

At the beginning of the banquet, Mr. Warburg asked if he might say a few words. Surprise and dismay were to be seen on the faces of the official speakers, but Mr. Warburg being the guest of honor, his request could not be denied.

Mr. Warburg arose, scanned the faces of those about him and with a

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EXCERPT

(Letter from Janice Oppenheimer '32)

Jerusalem,
Dec. 17, 1934.

Well, here I am in the Holy Land for the second time, and tired out from sightseeing, but unable to resist writing tonight anyway. . . .

In the afternoon we wandered about in a new residential quarter. There is an unbelievably furious amount of building going on here, but all the time we felt curiously as though we were on a movie set. The whole landscape is bare, yellow and very sparsely cultivated, and all the houses are of stone, built in a flat angular supermodern style. (B. D. says San Francisco is hopelessly behind the times in architecture.) They are etched so sharply against the deep blue sky and seem to be set down in such a haphazard fashion (as the preconceived plan of the district has not yet been accomplished) that they give an impression of impermanence and unreality. And the illusion is completed by the sight of many people walking up and down and solemnly greeting each other with "Shalom!" . . .

B. D. took us to see the Hebrew University on Mt. Scopus, which at present boasts 1000 students, of which 300 are from Palestine, and the others from over the world. At present it is mostly scientific with laboratories and a library, but they hope to establish the arts there, too, and a medical school next year when Hadassah's new hospital is built and eventually they will become the cultural center of the East, they fully expect . . . In fact an air of optimism, happiness, activity, faith in the future, does inspire these builders, whether they are in Hadassah, University or colony. It is grand to have a band in something you believe to be good and watching it grow. . . .

(The Hadassah Health Center) . . . is the best organized truly preventive organization I have seen. . . . They are thinking of erecting a monument to Hitler for sending all the good medics here.

We (are going) through to Haifa, visiting Tel-Aviv, The Agricultural Experiment Station and the Emek where most of the Zionist agricultural colonies are.

HILLEL'S EDUCATIONAL COURSES

In this Spring Semester the Hillel Foundation proposes to continue the tradition carried through the last four years, by offering an interesting series of lectures by highly qualified men. Beginning with Thursday evening, Feb. 7th, and continuing for four successive Thursday evenings, Jos. Gaer, lecturer in the extension department of the University of California, will offer a series of lectures on "The Jewish Contribution to the American Novel," giving a survey of the work and a critical analysis of the contributions of Lewisohn, Gertrude Stein, Abe Caban, Ben Hecht, Waldo Frank, Robert Natban, Nathan Asch, Maxwell Bodenheim, Dorothy Parker, Michael Gold, Lester Cohen, Albert Halper, Katherine Brody and Myron Brinig. Jos. Gaer's own literary work fits him for such a task and his popular Campus lectures in literary criticism have gained him a wide following.

Beginning with Thursday, March 7th, and continuing for four successive Thursday evenings Dr. Jack Rudé will offer a series of lectures dealing with the effect of the changing economic conditions on the life status and future of the Jew in Europe and the United States. No subject can be of more vital interest to the Jew today and to the Jewish student in particular. Nothing is more imperative than that the Jew must adjust himself to changing economic conditions. Every Jewish student preparing to find a place for himself in the world has an interest in this problem.

On the Hillel Library

Through the generosity of the B'nai Brith Women's Grand Lodge of District No. 4, we have been able to build up a Jewish Library at the Berkeley Foundation that is already the outstanding Jewish Library of the Pacific Coast. Through the zeal of the women's auxiliary of the B'nai Brith we have accumulated a library of nearly a thousand volumes that not only students, but also professional scholars are coming to recognize as an important contribution to Jewish knowledge and research. Here are Jewish reference works that are rich mines of Jewish knowledge. Here are outstanding novels and collections of essays by Jewish authors, native and foreign. Here are volumes that throw light on Jewish life, customs and folkways and works that unfold the unequalled romance of the Jewish past. Here is the product of the best Jewish minds calculated to illuminate the perplexing problems that face the Jew in this difficult and chaotic day.

We urge the student body to recognize the value and importance of this storehouse of Jewish knowledge. We invite an ever wider circulation of our books and a keener interest in this choice collection. "People of the Book" was once the proud title born by our forebears. Jewish students will find themselves enriched by maintaining the fine tradition that title suggests.

smile ironical and contemptuous, said: "Gentlemen, when I look about me, I find, kindly excuse my frankness, not a single man who has done anything of importance for the German shipping industry. The great and mighty shipping industry is primarily the work of two Jews. The one is the deceased Albert Ballin; the other is this man who has the honor of standing before you."

It is not my habit to speak about myself but as I know that you want to tell me something and are perhaps ashamed to say it, I shall allow myself to help you."

A deadly silence prevailed. Then Mr. Warburg continued:

Tells of Contribution to Industry

"If you were in my place and I were in yours I would say:

"My dear Mr. Warburg, it is difficult for us to part from a man who together with Mr. Albert Ballin created and made great our corporation, 'The Hamburg-American Line.' It is difficult for us to lose in you a citizen who, in the war, made such great sacrifices and rendered such service. And in addition we cannot forget that at the end of the war it was you, and you alone, who, out of only ruins, recreated with your energy and your money the German shipping industry. . . .

"And if we — new people here — must separate ourselves from our old co-worker, then it is our fault and not yours."

"This is what I would say if I were in your place. However the situation, being as it is, you must now permit me to withdraw and bid you farewell, until such time when you will once again need me."

So spoke Max Warburg. Then the great banker folded his napkin, bowed coldly and left the banquet hall.
