Rabbi Jacob Weinstein To Give Lecture Series

Rabbi Jacob Weinstein, Director of the Institute of Jewish Studies of the Jewish Community Center of San Francisco will initiate the educational program of the Berkeley Hillel Foundation for the Spring semester. Rabbi Weinstein's stimulating series of lectures delivered early in the Fall semester, drew capacity houses to the Foundation. His discussion of Anti-Semitism, Nationalism, Assimilation and the impact of modern social and economic forces on Jewish life and destiny, was closely followed and appreciated by his hearers.

Rabbi Weinstein developed a following by this series. He comes now to deliver a series of lectures on the history and philosophy of Zionism. And certainly no time would be more fitting for such a series illuminating one of the most romantic movements of our time than in this day when Palestine bulks so large in the Jewish world as the outstanding refuge for the imperiled Jews of Germany.

Rabbi Weinstein will offer his series on three successive Thursdays, February 13, 20, and 27.

His lectures will present vivid pen pictures of the outstanding Zionist personalities, Ahad-Haam, Theodore Herzl, A. D. Gordon, Schmerya Levin, Ussischkin, and Jabotinsky, and he will analyze the writing of Zionist thinkers and philosophers who have developed the Zionist ideology. He will also describe the various types of social organizations that have grown up in modern Palestine.

Hillel Open Forum Offers Archeologist

The Hillel Open Forum set an exceptionally high standard during the Fall semester, both in the distinguished type of lecturer presented on the Forum platform, and in the appropriateness of the topics discussed. Professor Harold Laswell's "Exposing the Nazi Mind," Professor Robert Kerner's description of his "Soviet Journey," and Professor Jacob Lowenberg's "Liberalism at Bay" will long be remembered as outstanding presentations.

With the opening of the new semester, it is hoped that this fine tradition will be carried on. On Wednesday evening, February 5th, at eight o'clock, Dr. Walter Morritt will appear on the Forum program. His theme, "The Roman Blacksmith's Anvil Solo," is a critical analysis of the Italian dream of Roman grandeur. Dr. Morritt was in Italy for ten years during the meteoric rise of Mussolini, while he served as Professor of English at the University of Turin. He has an intimate knowledge of the leading Italian Fascists, has made a study of the Italian affairs, and will give the inside story of his Ethiopian adventures.

On Sunday, February sixteenth, the second Forum lecture will be presented. James Filmore Collins was the official movie photographer of the Bade Expedition that, in 1935 completed the excavation of Tell en Nasbeh in Palestine. Tell en Nasbeh has been identified as the original Mizpeh of the Bible. Some astounding discoveries were made in the excavation of this long buried city. Mr. Collins will show films of his excavations, the excavators at work, the objects which have been brought to light, and the hardships of the archeologist's life. He will also show movies of the country, and of the agricultural life of Palestine.

Warning: Whatever you do, we'll be seeing you.

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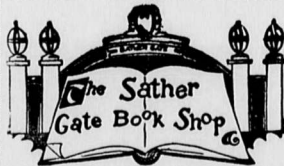
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What's What

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Hebrew Classes To Be Resumed at Hillel

Every Jew in the Diaspora is either a prospective visitor or inhabitant of Palestine. We should be glad to give time and effort to learn the language in which was written the Bible, the modern poetry, and the energetic contemporary Palestinian journals. 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Hillel's German Student Ward

The "Sponsor a German Student Drive" initiated by the Berkeley Hillel Foundation and carried to a successful conclusion has aroused interest all over the country, and we have been the recipient of hearty letters of commendation from many sources.

An invitation to come to Berkeley and to study at the University of California has been extended to Helmut Krotoszyner, a nineteen year old student, living in Berlin and a graduate of the Charlottenburg Gymnasium.

After considerable deliberation, it was decided that it would be a disadvantage to our German student to enter him at California in the middle of the year without giving him a chance to orient himself in the new environment. Therefore, his entry will be postponed till the Fall semester. He will arrive in San Francisco in July and be given a month to fit himself into the new surroundings before enrolling at California. Mr. Allen Blaisdell, Director of the International House, concurring in the wisdom of our arrangement, has agreed to extend the generous offer of a free-rent scholarship to young Krotoszyner for one year beginning in August.

SAN QUENTIN DEBATE

*Stone walls do not a prison make.
Nor iron bars a cage;*

Such might be the theme song of San Quentin prisoners in regard to the pursuit of learning. For the physical barriers of high walls and menacing guard towers, mounted with revolving machine guns, do not preclude educational opportunities for the state prisoners. Rather the fervor and enthusiasm with which studies are undertaken by over three thousand inmates of the prison are a revelation to the visiting University student.

It was this writer's good fortune to be the member of a debate team which met the prison squad on the forensic platform. Four hundred convicts listened eagerly to the arguments of both teams. Facial animation and spontaneous applause showed an appreciation greater than that which usually issues from the more blasé auditors of a campus debate. This may be due in part to the caliber of the prison team, which both intellectually and oratorically can hold its place with the finest of collegiate squads. Also of interest is the fact that over six hundred convicts who had requested permission to attend the debate were prevented from so doing by the limited seating capacity of the auditorium.

Yet debating is only one phase of the program of the ever active prison school. Under the guidance of Dr. Strader, executive director of the school, two hundred and fifty academic and technical courses are offered the convict student. Most classes are led by inmates, a large number of whom hold college degrees. Credit may also be obtained for courses in University Extension work.

According to Dr. Strader, many a hardened criminal eagerly embraces this opportunity for an education. They realize for the first time the advantage of converting misguided intelligence into a useful intellectual instrument. Such moral and mental rehabilitation as results from the well coordinated prison school system gives promise of easing the crime problem.

Salute To Julian Cahn

Julian Cahn was editor of the Hillel Call in 1930, his senior year at the University of California. He was an interested and active member of the Berkeley Hillel Foundation; he was a popular and gracious figure in the ranks of the Zeta Beta Tau; he was one of the most cooperative students on the Campus, participating enthusiastically in a wide variety of University activities. And when he left the campus, all who had come to appreciate his unusual equipment and his attractive personality predicted that he would make an outstanding success in life.

In the few years of his off-campus career he had gone far to fulfill that promise. He was of the rising young men in a great business organization. His future was assured. That future and that career was tragically cut short in the terrible accident near Goodwin, Arkansas when the luxury airliner went down to destruction. Julian Cahn's life was snuffed out in the heyday of youth and in the Spring of its promise. We who remember Julian Cahn sympathize in the loss that his fraters, his associates and his dear ones have sustained.
