INTERFAITH RELIGIOUS CONFERENCE TO BE HELD ON CALIFORNIA CAMPUS

Dr. Ephraim Frisch of San
Antonio, Texas, To Be
Jewish Representative

Thelma Samuely, member of the Hillel Student Council and president of the Interfaith Council of the University of California, announces that plans have been completed for the holding of the largest religious conference ever attempted on the California campus. The Interfaith Council is composed of delegates speaking for fourteen religious groups — twelve Protestant bodies, Newman Hall and the Hillel Foundation. Through this unique religious conference Protestant, Catholic and Jewish students will unite in a campus-wide study of religion, with special reference to its service to College youth and its efficacy in solving the perplexing problems that youth faces in the transition years and in these critical times.

The Interfaith Council has arranged to bring to the campus three outstanding leaders of the three faiths involved in the conference. Dr. Edgar Allen Lowther will represent the Protestants. Father Bolling of St. Mary's College will represent the Catholics, and Dr. Ephraim Frisch of San Antonio, Texas, will represent the Jewish group. All these men are leaders in their fields with a scholarly equipment that qualifies them to speak with authority on the issues to be discussed.

The general theme of the three-day conference is "Religion and Us — For" (Continued on Page 4, Col 2 and 3)

Services will be conducted by Rabbi Merritt while the Hillel Chorus under the direction of Sylvain Bernstein will lead in the singing of the Seder songs and the new Palestinian folk songs. Invitations have been mailed to all students registered from outside the Bay District and it is urged that reservations be made as soon as possible in order that the Alliance Committee may be guided in their preparations.

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Leo Schwarz Lecture

Taking as his theme, "The Jew Faces the Modern World," Leo Schwarz, editor of "The Jewish Caravan", and director of the New York School for Adult Jewish Education, spoke at Hillel under the auspices of the Educational Committee. Mr. Schwarz proved to be a speaker of extraordinary ability and charm and his lecture was one of the most illuminating the Hillel group has heard.

Mr. Schwarz first set forth the factors in the life of our day that make our environment so radically different from that of one hundred years ago. Life then was static; today it is in flux. The generation of a century ago could, with a certain degree of sureness, predict the future on the basis of stable factors. Autarchy, overemphasized nationalism, the exigencies of capitalism, the growing solidarity of the masses—all these have helped to make life unstable and uncertain. "Jews", said the speaker, "have always been powerfully affected by their environment. They have never lived in a vacuum. The so-called Jewish problem is inextricably tied up with the economical and social problem."

"The problem of our generation," continued Mr. Schwarz, "is to relieve the Jew of the resentment he has come to feel because of the handicaps his Judaism imposes on him." First of all, Jews must be informed—"What we need is not reformed, deformed, but informed Jews." Adult Jewish education is the key to the solution of this problem. We shall have a different type of Jew in the Jew who knows his past, his traditions, and the richness of his culture. Such a Jew will be equipped to face the world head up. The Jew must be made to realize that anti-semitism is not an entity in itself but

The debaters sent to San Jose were Nathan Gilbert, Meyer Kahn, Thelma Samuely, and Isabel Goldeen. They debated the subject, "Resolved: That the Jews of the world support the Jewish National Homeland in Palestine." The following letter is evidence of the impression that the Hillel debaters made:

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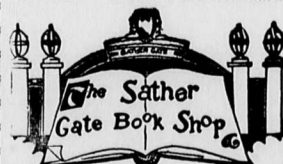

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An Idea Falls on Fertile Soil

When the Berkeley Hillel Foundation launched its campaign last fall to raise a sufficient sum to support a German Jewish refugee student on the California Campus, it initiated that drive in the hope that other foundations would take up the idea and prove that American Jewish student comradeship and compassion can meet a harrowing emergency.

News from the east is evidence that our confidence was well founded. The Hillel Foundation of Northwestern University has raised a fund to care for a German Jewish refugee student. And now the "mother foundation" of the University of Illinois has launched a campaign to raise a fund for the same praiseworthy purpose. Emulation in fine service is one of the motives that is strengthening the hold of the Hillel Foundation movement on the goodwill of American Jewry. We ardently hope that the idea will command itself to every Jewish college group of appreciable numbers in America.

The Festival of Freedom

Passover will soon be with us once again. Time was when we greeted the coming of the Passover with the cordial welcome with which all religious groups have hailed the coming of the Festival of Spring. That ancient festival had come to be invested with the charm of the most gracious season of the year. If we acclaimed it as the Festival of Freedom, it was because that epochal event of emancipation from Egyptian slavery was the first recorded victory in the long struggle for a political freedom that we confidently believed could never again be questioned.

Today we know how grievously we have been deceived. Political freedom was never in greater jeopardy. Civil liberty today is literally engaged in a struggle for life. The mailed hand of Fascist tyranny threatens all of the treasured freedoms that beginning with the triumph of Moses have been won by ages of struggle and sacrifice.

Heinrich Heine it was who said that from the day of Moses freedom has spoken with a Jewish accent. The love of freedom is a tradition in the House of Israel. Contemporary events are proof that freedom very literally means life to the modern Jew. The battle for freedom today is being fought on a world-wide front. The coming of the Festival of Freedom is a summons to the Jew to play his historic part in that struggle.

Hillel Open Forum

Professor Thomas Addis of the Stanford School of Medicine, was the Hillel Open Forum guest speaker for the first session in March. He took as his theme, "The Soviet — 1935," and proved to be a speaker of rare charm and balanced judgment. He paid tribute to the astonishing industrial achievement of New Russia and predicted that its advances in medical science would soon match its achievements in the industrial field. He asserted that, while western industrial countries were still in the lead in the production of commodities, the Soviet had performed marvels in the task of transforming agrarian society to bring Russia into line with countries having one hundred years start. The lecture was illustrated by fine moving pictures of various aspects of daily life under the Soviet regime.

Wednesday, March 11th, Robin Lampson, author of the best seller, "Laughter Out of the Ground," was guest speaker for the Hillel Forum. He delighted his audience with descriptions of the gold rush era upon which his novel is based, and with readings from his fascinating book.

Fireside Forum

Sanford Goldner made the first March meeting of the Fireside Discussion Group interesting by his review and discussion of Walter Duranty's best-seller: "I Write As I Please." He gave an account of the career and personality of the premier foreign correspondent, and by reading selections from the book, showed the gradual change of judgment, with reference to Soviet experiences, that has reshaped Duranty's view.

A visitor who gave one of the most fascinating talks of the year was Anita Bradley who addressed the Forum Group on "China Today." Frankly a partisan for Chinese people and Chinese aspirations, Miss Bradley, out of rich experience as a teacher in a Chinese University, enlisted the interest and sympathy of her hearers for these much-tried people.

On Friday, March 27, Morton Gaba, '34, graduate student in the department of Political Science, reviewed and discussed Walter Millis' book, "The Road to War."

Those Who Wonder." The first session of the conference will be held in Wheeler Auditorium, Tuesday evening, March 31, at 8 p. m. Professor H. R. Hatfield will act as chairman. The special theme to which the speakers will address themselves will be "Old Faiths in Our Lives." The speakers will deal with the common heritage that the three faiths bring to the life of college youth and the need of reshaping that heritage to meet the needs of our day.

The second evening session of the conference will be held in the auditorium of International House, Wednesday evening, April 1, at 7:30 p. m. The specific theme to which Dr. Lowther, Father Bolling and Rabbi Frisch will address themselves will be "Religion — The Individual and the Present." The third evening session of the conference will be held in the auditorium of International House, Thursday evening, April 2, at 7:30 p. m., and the same speakers will discuss the theme, "Religion — Social Ideals and the Future Prospects."

In order that students may take an active part in the conference, open forums will be held Wednesday and Thursday afternoons from 3 to 5 p. m., at the Y. W. C. A. Cottage and the three speakers will be present to answer specific questions and to clarify the positions developed in the formal evening addresses.

The conference will be inaugurated with a dinner of welcome to the speakers at International House, Tuesday evening, March 31, at 6 p. m. Dinner tickets are on sale to the student body for 75 cents. Arthur Harris will act as toastmaster at the International House welcome dinner. Dr. David P. Barrows will speak for the faculty. Henry Dyke Brown and Bobby Jean McHenry will speak for the student body.

This conference promises to be of absorbing interest. As a cooperative venture on the part of Protestant,

Catholic and Jewish student groups it is unique. This is an opportunity to make for a better understanding of religion itself and the variant viewpoints of the three great faiths on the crucial questions of our day.

Dr. Ephraim Frisch of San Antonio, Texas, who will represent the Jewish group, is on an extended lecture tour of the West Coast and that accounts for our good fortune in having him as our representative. He is the spiritual head of one of the most important congregations of the southwest. He is a graduate of the Hebrew Union College and took his B. A. at the University of Cincinnati. His graduate work was at the University of Chicago and Columbia University, New York and he holds a Ph. D. from Columbia. In San Antonio, he founded the San Antonio Open Forum and is a member of its executive board. As a member of the executive board of the Central Conference of American Rabbis he has won national recognition. He has lectured at many universities and colleges. He is a member of the Institute of Politics, Williams College, Williamstown, Mass., and a member, too, of the First Mexico Seminar sponsored by the Committee on Cultural Relations in Latin America.
