IZFA To Present Balfour Day Program

Balfour Day, 1946, will be marked by a special program presented by the Intercollegiate Zionist Federation of America at 8 p.m., November 1, at the Hillel Foundation.

The program will be part of the regular Friday evening service. Balfour Day marks the anniversary of the issuance of the famed declaration of Lord Balfour of Great Britain on November 1, 1917. His statement of policy made it clear that it was Great Britain's intention to support the establishment of a Jewish national homeland in Palestine. News reports daily tell of the new British attitudes on the subject.

Z'ev Brinner, cultural chairman of the IZFA, is in charge of the evening. President Nisson Gratz will deliver a message during the program.

The Intercollegiate Zionist Federation of America chapter on the Berkeley campus is the local branch of the world Zionist movement. Through its broad program of general Zionism, it offers a meeting ground for all those who are supporting the establishment of Palestine as the Jewish national homeland. Membership in the group is recommended to all sympathetic persons regardless of individual political preferences.

Hillel Exceeds Quota

The Red Feather flies over Hillel today, indicating that Hillel members exceeded their Community Chest quota this year.

Rabbi Joseph Gitin reported collections of over \$550, while the quota for the Foundation was \$490. Not only do Hillelites contribute to the national Community Chest campaign, but they also benefit by an allowance granted by the local agency branch.

Those participating as solicitors, under the guidance of Rabbi Gitin, were Web Phillips, Harold Berg, Rosalie Neff, Dolores Rosenberg and Mrs. Gitin. The workers are to be congratulated on the success of their efforts, which means that once again they batted over 100%.

SACHAR ADDRESSES HILLEL

Young people everywhere are in danger of falling victim to the petrifying disillusionment which is sweeping the country, Abram L. Sachar, national Hillel Foundation president, warning some 350 persons in an address during Friday evening services October 25.

Sachar, eminent historian, news commentator and lecturer, conceded that some disappointment in the return to petty squabbles and power politics is justifiable on the part of veterans who feel entitled to a better world after their sacrifices. However, a sense of perspective must not be lost by failing to consider what civilization so narrowly escaped.

The Neurnberg summaries of Nazi war crimes well might be a prospectus of the life we would be leading today had not a mere 21 miles of sea water separated the Nazi hordes from the British isles after Dunkerque.

Liberals everywhere are liable to sacrifice the progress the world has made in the vain quest for an ideal society, Sachar observed, in reiterating the futility of perfec-

tionism. Although the isolationism of Wheeler, Nye and Fish is dead, a new type of neo-isolationism is growing in the ranks of these liberals, and it is feeding on the universal tired feeling, Dr. Sachar continued. No man or woman alive today, he predicted, will ever live the normal life of pre-war days which many expected to resume.

Opening of twelve new Hillel units in the last year was reported by Sachar, bringing the total to 150. Immediately after his appearance here last Thanksgiving, when he spoke on Jewish humor, he flew to Cuba where he opened a new foundation at the University of Havana, fourth largest educational institution in the Western Hemisphere. Registration of 5500 Jewish student in the three Los Angeles universities indicated an expansion of sixty per cent, and more than two thousand Jewish students are now in attendance at the University of Illinois at Champaign where Sachar formerly was a Hillel director and associate professor of history.

Dr. Sachar expressed personal gratitude to Rabbi Gitin for the work he is doing in Berkeley. Rabbi Gitin expressed the hope of Hillel students that Sachar will return to Berkeley soon.

FROM THE RABBI . . .

Dear Students:

President Sproul, in his opening address to the student body, pointed out that the religious Foundations are an integral part of campus and university life, and he urged that Jewish students affiliate with Hillel.

I have often stated that the student who overlooks what Hillel offers is depriving himself of something immeasurably worthwhile. Sometimes it may be difficult to reckon the practical benefits. When some students pointedly ask, "What will I get out of Hillel membership?" it isn't enough to answer that Hillel membership entitles one to a financial reduction at special events or the right to vote, etc. There is much more to Hillel that has proved itself as a definite force in the fashioning of our lives as Jews and Americans.

Let me essay to portray Hillel's role in the life of the Jewish student. Hillel is a synagogue, school, social center. It seeks to satisfy your religious, cultural, and social needs. It is a spiritual prophylactic that affords students psychic wholeness. It is not merely an antidote to the poison of self-hate but it is a definite factor in giving one a sense of balance a feeling of serenity and dignity.

Hillel enables you to stand up and face the world not with fear but with faith; not with indignation but with inspiration; not with subservience but with self-respect, as scions of a great heritage that has much to offer to the Jew and to the world. It emphasizes the truth that "To thine own self be true, then thou canst not be false to any other man . . ."

Hillel is our synagogue. Our religious service, featuring student participation and discussion, cannot help but give you a feeling of spiritual at-homeness. It speaks of the beauty and meaning of the Jewish faith and correlates that faith with the challenge and blessing of American democracy. It emphasizes the need of religious values, especially in this atomic age, and points out with profound insight and from historic experience that without the eternal verities our world cannot long survive.

Hillel is a school. The cultural facets include classes, Supper Forums, and Peripatetic Panel Discussions in which students present programs to various groups throughout the Bay Area—seminars, musicals, and Film Festivals. These cultural activities crystallize the fact that we cannot have a sense of pride unless we know who and what we are. Through knowledge Hillel helps to change the emphasis of the Jewish student from mere circumstance to a Jew with tradition, heritage, and purpose.

Let us not forget our magnificent Hillel library with more than 4,000 volumes. It should be utilized not only as a place of study but also as a treasure-trove of Jewish and American culture. Perhaps you are interested in writing a thesis or composition for one of your classes. Many students have earned the plaudits of their professors for dissertations based on Jewish sources.

Finally, Hillel is a social center, a home away from home. For relaxation, social opportunities for making and renewing fine friendships Hillel offers its facilities. Withal, let us affiliate with Hillel and derive from it those benefits which can give us the serenity and integrity and joy which we all seek.

EDITORIAL . . .

The California voter may express his support of democratic principles by voting for proposition 11 on the November 5 ballot, setting up a commission which would enforce a Fair Employment Practices Act. Passage of proposition 11 will outlaw discrimination in employment because of race, religion or ancestry.

A commission of this type is now working successfully in New York and Massachusetts.

The American of Jewish faith has a moral obligation to support this act. His people have always stood for democracy, and have been always in the forefront of any battle to uphold it. Surely the Jewish victim of persecution in Europe will testify to the fact that discrimination is the root of Fascism.

The act was introduced through popular initiative, and has the support of Democrats and Republicans, church leaders, including Rabbi Gitin of our Foundation, both major labor unions and professional groups.

For the student who is not eligible to vote November 5, a variety of work must be done to insure passage of this and other measures. The voter must be made aware that passage of proposition 12 would invalidate 11, and 15 would further restrict freedom of certain loyal citizens to buy California land. House to house canvassers are needed to help "get out the vote," for a large vote insures a democratic one. Clerical work must be done in the campaign headquarters at 2161 Shattuck, and literature must be distributed. Financial contributions are needed to combat the attempt of small groups of powerful businessmen to smear the F.E.P.C. with a shower of falsehoods.

Hillel Joins Interfaith Council

Participation by the Hillel Foundation in the program of the Interfaith Religious Council was recommended in a resolution passed by the student council Monday, Oct. 14.

The I. R. C. is designed to promote cooperation and understanding among the various denominational groups on campus. It has proven successful at other campuses, and will bring to the individual an awareness of the role of other religions in relation to our own.

Student representatives are headed by Hal Berg, and Rabbi Gitin represents the Foundation on the executive committee.

Hillel To Speak To B'nai B'rith

A group of Hillel student speakers will journey to Oakland on November 19 to present a program for the Oakland Women's Chapter of the B'nai B'rith.

"Jewish Self Hate" is the topic of President Dave Robins' address. Bunny Shapiro will review discriminatory practices in universities throughout the country, with emphasis on professional schools. Miriam Landes, who has appeared in numerous musical programs of late to the great enjoyment of all her audiences will lend her voice to a number of Palestinian songs.

Crossing the bay on December 4, the group will be the guests of a banquet in honor of Hillel Night at the San Francisco Unity Women's Chapter of the B'nai B'rith.

HECHALUTZ TO HOLD CONVENTION

The Hechalutz Organization of America, which facilitates emigration of American Jews to Palestine, will soon hold its annual convention. Students who join may defer their departure up to three years, and requirements of membership are few. Interested persons should contact Nisson Gratz, president of the Intercollegiate Zionist Federation chapter and local Hechalutz representative.

HISTADRUT OPENS OFFICE IN SAN FRANCISCO

The Histadrut, Palestinian labor union which is now engaged in soil reclamation and vocational training, has opened its San Francisco office under the direction of Moshe Berman. A financial campaign will continue throughout the coming month. All Zionist groups are united in supporting its activities.

Advantages of Memberships Pointed Out

Hillel Foundation being the official representative of Jewish students on the campus, it is the moral obligation of every Jewish student on the campus to support it by buying a membership card, Bunny Shapiro, head of the membership committee, reminded students today.

RELIGIOUS PROGRAM OUTLINED . . .

Judaism's role in the modern student's life is the dominant theme of the semester program which today had been drawn up by Miriam Levich, religious committee chairman of the student council.

First holiday of the season, Rosh Hashonah, the Jewish New Year which marks the opening of the Ten Days of Penitence, was observed in conjunction with Congregation Beth-El at the Twentieth Century Club. Kol Nidre, the traditional strains which open the service on the eve of Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, was sung by Cantor Albert Wollner to a capacity crowd. Rabbi Joseph Gitin delivered the sermons, urging all his hearers to search their own souls for the answers to the vexing problems which face humanity.

A colorfully decorated arbor-covered Succah, set the scene for the Friday evening Succoth service which opened the eight-day holiday. Hoshanah Rabbah, which takes place on the fifth day of the festival, offers one more opportunity for the individual to repent as the Book of Life is finally sealed for the year, as the leaves of the lulov and etrog fall to the floor representing the shedding of all past and future sins.

The final day of Succoth, Simchat Torah, the Rejoicing of the Law, is traditionally observed by the reading of the final chapter from the Scroll of the Law. In the evening the scrolls are carried around the synagogue in a procession seven times.

The appearance of Dr. A. L. Sachar at Friday evening services, October 25, is reported in an adjoining column. Friday, November 1, Balfour Day, will be marked by a program presented by the Intercollegiate Zionist Federation of America.

Orthodox services are being conducted each Friday evening at 7 p.m. by two students. Regular services begin at 8 p.m. The need of cooperation from the students was emphasized by Miss Levich.
