Mike Flint, Hillel's human dynamo, directed the campaign which was launched early in April with a goal of \$3,000. A month later the goal was reached, and two weeks ago the \$4,000 mark was passed.

conducted in a congenial atmosphere that was conducive to spontaneous discussion and exchange of views; the Sunday forums, classes, musicales, which afforded all of us an outlet for expression; the dances and social gatherings which served as delightful background for the cultivation of friendship and romance.

I shall long remember, too, my counselling experiences when students with problems needed and found a sympathetic ear and an understanding heart. How it gladdened my heart when these same students came to the realization, after gaining a proper perspective, how easily one's 'Tzauros' could become utterly dissipated into 'mists of nothingness.'

My association with Hillel has strengthened my faith in the leading role our college youth will play in the challenging drama of Jewish life. Our Jewish communities are in dire need of leaders who are not peripheral but integral Jews who will be eager to devote their time and energy to enhance the prestige and strengthen the fabric of the Jewish way of life. They will be qualified leaders whose historical incident of birth will be implemented by a knowledge and appreciation of the Hebrew Heritage; theirs will be the joyous and consecrated task to transmute that Yerusha into a Morasha, into a positive, uplifting Jewish life.

What has been done in Palestine during the past sixty years could be better understood if illustrated by a fable.

Mustapha had a car. It was a good automobile, but being a careless driver, Mustapha ruined the vehicle and threw it on the junk heap. But Yehuda, who always had wanted a car, came along and found Mustapha's automobile. Yehuda took it and, after spending a lot of money and energy, fixed it so that it ran perfectly. To whom does the car now belong? Obviously to Yehuda!

"MASK FOR PRIVILEGE"

One of the best books to approach the problem of anti-semitism logically and factually is "Mask for Privilege," by Carey McWilliams.

His basic theme is that anti-semitism is mainly an economic weapon to avoid Jewish competition. McWilliams compares anti-semitism in the United States to that in pre-war Germany and shows that if we do not take positive action to be on guard, what happened in Germany might happen here.

He declares that this "mask for privilege" and Fascism run hand in hand. Just as a patient is sick when he has a high fever, so is that country with a high degree of anti-semitism also sick, says McWilliams.

The author's solution is mainly one of assimilation. With the creation of a Jewish homeland, the Diaspora (Jews outside of Palestine) will not feel the need of carrying on the torch for Judaism so strongly and will tend to be more free in losing their identity.

McWilliams is strongly in favor of the President's Civil Rights Bill, which he hopes will enable a quicker assimilation. The importance of discontinuing the social discriminations against the Jewish minority is strongly stressed.

All Americans, advocates the author, must fight this dreaded infection, anti-semitism, by stamping it out whenever and wherever they find it.—MIKE FLINT.

How many of us appreciate the fact that the B'nai B'rith maintains the Hillel Foundation, a responsi-



bility it has assumed for the past two decades. We seem to take for granted the effective labors of this century-old organization on behalf of the Jewish student on the campus.

With characteristic vision and courage, the B'nai B'rith devotes itself to the cultural, religious and counselling service among a potential 200,000 Jewish students at more than 180 units established on the campi throughout the world. Although it is regarded as a secular organization, it engages more than 150 Rabbis to direct and counsel, and to help strengthen and intensify religious feeling and loyalty.
